PRODUCT INFORMATION

FDB Møbler’s dining chair is designed for sunny lunches and long summer evenings in the garden. It is a chair designed according to the traditions shared by FDB Møbler, but reinterpreted as a piece of garden furniture. The natural, oiled teak creates the same feel as the classic dining chairs that we use inside. However, the material and shape are, of course, adapted for outdoor use. The chair beautifully matches the two dining tables in the series. The chair exudes an air of quality and style not normally associated with garden furniture.

Thomas Alken (b. 1970) graduated as a furniture and industrial designer from Design School Kolding in 1997. He has been involved in a wide range of design projects, from luxury furniture and ketchup bottles to a lounge at Copenhagen Airport, because it is the user situation that fascinates him. In his view, furniture must always be seen in a larger context. And with the ‘Sammen’ (Together) series, he has made sure that the furniture harmonises with the traditions of FDB Møbler as well as Danish gardens.

CARE INSTRUCTIONS

We always recommend that garden furniture is carefully looked after and maintained. In Denmark, humidity levels and large temperature fluctuations can cause wood to crack and warp. This means that mould, for example, is more likely to attack the wood. So, there are many good reasons why you should maintain your wooden garden furniture. The wood will retain its beautiful colour rather than becoming grey and dreary to look at. The garden furniture will be protected against degradation from the weather, wind and sun, and will therefore last longer. With proper treatment, teak garden furniture can last for many years. Teak contains a lot of natural oils and minerals, so teak furniture can to some

extent be left untreated. Over time, the wood will acquire a silver-grey surface, as the rain and sun wash and dry out the top oil layer which is naturally found in the wood. However, to keep the wood healthy, it is a good idea to oil your furniture at least once a year. If you wish to retain the silver-grey finish, use natural oil without colour pigments.

Wooden garden furniture should be washed often to remove dust and dirt to prevent blotching etc. on the surface. If you want to retain the beautiful golden hue of new teak, it should be treated with oil one to three times a year like all other wood types, and with a teak oil containing colour pigments. 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Sanding

Often the wood will rise after being soaked with water and cleaner, so all the surfaces need to be sanded. Both oiled and painted garden furniture must be sanded. This is necessary to create a fine, smooth surface before treating with oil, or to ensure that the paint adheres to the wood. If the furniture has marks or discolorations which have not been properly treated, or if the furniture has not been stored correctly, such marks and discolorations can often be removed by sanding. Any sanding dust should be removed before the next step.

Oiling/painting

Oiling/painting should be done in a relatively warm place (10-25°C), but not inside so you avoid inhaling oil fumes. Protect the wood with fungicidal oil or paint that will prevent mould and algae growth. If the garden furniture is going to be painted, the best result is achieved by first applying a layer of primer, which should always be allowed to dry until the following day. If the garden furniture is going to be oiled, it is a good idea to use a pigmented oil, which protects the wood against the sun's harmful UV rays. Evenly apply the wood oil or paint using a brush. Take care to saturate the end grain with oil/paint. If necessary, wipe off any small pools of surplus oil on horizontal surfaces with a cloth. These form when the wood is saturated with oil. The garden furniture must have at least two coats of oil/paint to ensure a satisfactory finish. Once the garden furniture has been treated, it should be left for a few days until the oil/paint is completely dry and can withstand the rain, sun and wind outside. The better the quality of the oil/paint, the better the result. Oil or paint can be purchased from paint shops, builders' merchants and DIY stores. Here, it is also possible to obtain professional advice on which type of oil/paint to use.

PRODUCT INFORMATION

This large garden table is perfect for spending time and socialising outdoors. Here, we come together for long lunches and cheerful bonhomie during the long summer evenings. FDB Møbler has produced countless dining tables over the years, and C201b should be seen as part of this tradition – just for outdoor use. The table has naturally rounded ends, with the ingenious detail that the ends can be detached, and then two tables can be joined using a table leaf.



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

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

The bench might be slightly loose at the joints as a result of the wood expanding/shrinking depending on the season. If so, simply retighten the bolts.



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
